This year will be an active hurricane season. It all ready has been. Hurricane season starts on June 1 and runs through November 30 with the peak of the hurricane season being mid September. The peak is about September 10 and we are there now. History shows us a lot of the worst hurricanes hit between mid August and mid September. Although there has been a number of notable storms that have hit in October.

This year there will be between 19 and 25 named storms. 7-11 hurricanes and 3-5 majors. The latest predictions have showed 19-25 named storms. 7-11 hurricanes and at first 6-8 majors. If those figures are right. What is right is the number of named storms at 19-25. Another thing that is right is the number of hurricanes. 19 - 25 named storms there has been 17 named storms and we are just now at the peak of the season. The season peaks now and there are only 4 more names on this years list.

Now for the number of major hurricanes there I will say 3–5 majors. Up to this point of the season there has been 17 named storms. 5 hurricanes and 1 major hurricane. That 1 major hurricane was Lora. So most of the hurricane predictions are on track. We are on pace for most of those numbers. As far as the number of majors there may not be as many majors as was predicted earlier in the year. I will say there will be somewhere between 3 and 5 majors. So far there has been only 1 major hurricane. That Major one was Lora. Most of the others have been no more than tropical storms. As far as the number of hurricanes the predicted number here is 7 - 11 hurricane. We are still on pace there there has been 5 hurricanes. 4 cat 1 hurricanes and 1 major one that being Lora. The first is 19 - 25 named storms there are only 21 names on the list though. After that we have to start over with the Greek alphabet. The names that are still to come on this years list are Sallie, Tetty, Vickie and Willfreed. So now we are down to the final 4 names on the list before we start over with the Greek letters.

The only other time we had to start over with the Greek alphabet was back in 2005. That year we set a record for number of named storms. There were 27 named storms. They chose to keep the 28th storm nameless because it formed so late in the year. All so there were 15 hurricanes that was a record. There were 7 major Hurricanes that year and 4 of those were cat 5's both of those were also records. Two of those had precer readings below 900 millabars that was a record.

One of those set a record for the most intense hurricane on record in the Atlantic at 882 Millabars. That one was Willma. That year also set a record for the most retired names in one year. That year there were 5 retired names that was a record. Two of those names that were retired has preser readings below 900 millabars. Those were Reeda that measered 895 millabars and Willma that measured 882 Millibars Willma was the strongest Hurricane of that year. The names are recycled and reused every 6 years in the case of a particuler deadly or damaging storm that storm's name is retired and a replacement starting with the same letter is selected to take it's place. They are retired at that point because the name becomes offensive. There is sensivity to the name. Nobody wants to ever hear that name again. It would be insensitive to use that same name on a future system and so when they become destructive enough or deadly enough the name is retired and a new name is selected to take it's place.

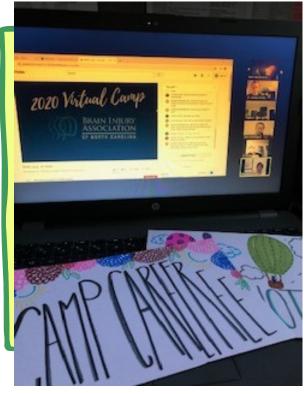

CAMP CAREFREE

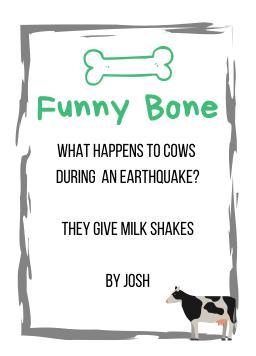




Gateway Clubhouse is participating in Camp Carefree virtual camp this week! We are so excited and having so much fun. Thank you to everyone who is participating and creating content.







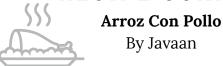
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RECIPE CORNER





Ingredients For the chicken:

2 tablespoon olive oil, divided 1½ pounds boneless skinless chicken thighs

For the adobo seasoning:

1 teaspoon cumin 3/4 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon chili powder
½ teaspoon red cayenne pepper
½ teaspoon onion powder
½ teaspoon garlic powder
¼ teaspoon coriander
½ teaspoon salt
Freshly ground black pepper

For the sofrito & rice:

3 cloves garlic, minced ¼ cup finely diced green pepper ¼ cup finely diced white onion ¼ cup finely diced cilantro

Optional:

1 jalapeno, diced

1/4 teaspoon ground coriander

1/4 teaspoon ground turmeric

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

1/4 teaspoon oregano

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

1 cup tomato sauce

1 1/4 cups water

1 cup basmati white rice (don't use brown, it will take too long to cook)**2/5 cup frozen peas (or rinsed and drained pigeon peas)

OPTIONAL: 1/2 cup pitted green olives
