Attitudes to School Survey – Year 4 to 6

The Attitudes to School Survey is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist our school to gain an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Students will be asked about their thoughts and feelings in relation to their school, their learning, peer relationships, bullying and life in general.

Students from years 4 to 6 at our school will participate in the survey. Your child will complete the survey online during school hours using a purpose built secure online survey tool. It is important to note that we are not in any way "testing" your child. Your child has the right to refuse or withdraw from the survey at any time.

Students will be provided with a unique login to complete the survey. The student login is an <u>assigned identifier</u> that may be used to link data for statistical and research purposes only. All responses to the survey are kept anonymous in the response file. Personal identification data will not be recorded in the survey response file. This ensures that the confidentiality of responses is protected at all times.

This year the Attitudes to School survey will be conducted at our school over the period 17th to 28th of May. The survey takes around 20-45 minutes to complete and occurs during class time.

The survey results will be reported back to the school in an aggregate form throughout the survey period. All survey data that is made available in reports are for groups of students only so that no individual student can be identified.

NAPLAN information

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) 2021 for years 3,5, 7 and 9 students will be held on Tuesday 11th of May, Wednesday 12th of May and Thursday 13th of May. NAPLAN tests assess student knowledge and skills in Writing, Reading, Language Conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and Numeracy.

We are ensuring that students are familiar with the test formats. We are very aware that excessive preparation is not appropriate or useful and can lead to unnecessary anxiety.

NAPLAN tests are constructed to give students an opportunity to demonstrate skills they have learned over time through the school curriculum, and NAPLAN test days should be treated as just another routine event at school. The best way you can help your child prepare for NAPLAN is to reassure them that these tests are just one part of their school program, and to urge them to simply do the best they can on the day. NAPLAN does not replace, but rather complements, assessments that your child participates in throughout the year.

Please do not send along swords/space toy or space weapons of any sort and ensure your child can still manage their day at school in a costume they may wear. This is not compulsory to dress up. Students will be fully supervised at all times by school staff.

From the Preps

Literacy – Our literacy plan for the term is to continue the Jolly Phonics program and begin to introduce digraphs such as 'ai' and 'oa' and 'ng'. We are working on our blending in reading as well as skills such as tracking the word with the finger and fluency. In writing we are focusing on making sure that a sentence contains one idea and ends with a full stop before beginning the next sentence. We are also continuing to develop our handwriting skills and letter formation.



Numeracy – Our numeracy plan for the term is to introduce subtraction. This will be done using both concrete materials and written/verbal problems and solutions. We are beginning to look at shapes around us and the features of basic shapes such as triangles, squares, rectangles and pentagons. Later in the term we will introduce the concept of time to the students as well as position and location.

Topic – Our topic for term 2 is Australia. We will expose the students to the map of Australia and take a look at the different states. During this unit we will investigate Indigenous Australians, Aboriginal art and a brief history of Australia.

During term 2 we will also be taking part in swimming every Thursday for the first 5 weeks of term. On Wednesday mornings we will be completing the PMP program which is designed to improve students' balance, hand/eye coordination and fitness.

We will also be continuing the PBL sessions on Monday and Tuesday mornings. These lessons provide the students with opportunities to work collaboratively and explore things that interest them. The aim for these lessons is for the students to investigate and explore while developing skills and building their confidence. This term we will have areas such as art, imaginative play and construction open to be explored. The students will be able to choose the area that interests them and they will have many opportunities to show their creativity.

Years 1/2

Literacy and Numeracy-

The students will start off the term with developing their knowledge of various writing strategies such as the power of three, onomatopoeia, alliteration and similes. They will be identifying these in a range of texts, as well as using these in their writing to enhance and create further interest in their pieces. Later in the term, to tie in with our 'SAKG', we will be learning about procedural texts and their key features using different examples for reading and writing.

In Mathematics, our current number focus is developing addition and subtraction strategies, such as, counting on, counting back, tens facts, doubles etc. The students will learn to measure time with clocks (half hour - year 1 and quarter hour - year 2) and calendars as well as develop an awareness of the duration of time intervals. Students will investigate two- and three-dimensional shapes and explore location by giving and following directions and interpreting simple maps.

Topic-SAKG-

This term year 1 and 2 will be participating in our SAKG program, where they will be cooking and gardening. We will be bringing this into our classrooms for our term topic focus. Students will discuss gardening tools, ideal climates for specific plants and identifying indigenous plants. The term's project will link in with our 'SAKG' topic, the students will be asked to present a procedure ('how to...') to the class either presenting on the day or showing a recording. Our classes will also make a class book using a recipe that the students have chosen from home.

Play Based Learning (PBL)

Students have been developing their social and thinking skills through four open-ended activities – a dramatic play area, e.g. puppets, construction area (Lego), pasting/creative table and imaginative play area with, e.g. toy animals and natural materials. Students are also building their stamina to work for extended periods on an activity.












YEAR 2

Welcome to Term 2 in 3/4KB and 3/4N

NUMERACY

Our main focus area of the Numeracy curriculum this term continues to be number. Students will be expanding their understanding about numbers to thousands and tens of thousands through ordering, modelling and mathematical thinking. Our 3/4 classes will also have a strong emphasis on subtraction strategies and applying these to solve more complex subtraction, in efficient and effective ways. They will also build on their knowledge of the connection between subtraction and addition and the importance this plays in solving mathematical problems.

LITERACY

Our reading sessions incorporate decoding, comprehension and fluency skills. This term our teaching is focused on extending our student's ability to decode (read) more complex and topic specific words. The students will be explicitly taught a range of decoding strategies such as chunking to improve this skill. We will be supporting our student's comprehension (understanding) of the texts they reading, through strategies such as visualisation and finding evidence in the text to support their answers. Students will also work at improving their reading fluency with sessions on phrasing, reading with expression and using punctuation to enhance and pace their reading.

Writing this term will involve a strong focus on the narrative and persuasive genres. Each class will be looking at the features of each text type, identifying and applying the language choices associated with each. Students will be engaged in learning about planning their text, writing a sizzling start and developing well-structured writing pieces, both collaboratively and independently.

Students will develop their ability to negotiate in collaborative situations and use interaction skills, including active listening and clear, coherent communications.

TOPIC



This term we are investigating 'Australian Indigenous History and the First European Contact'. Our learning intention is to develop an understanding of Australian history and identify the importance of our First Peoples and their culture. We will be working on answering questions like:

- -Who lived in Australia first and how do we know?
- -What was life like for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples before the arrival of the Europeans?
- -Why did the great journeys of exploration occur?
- -Why did the Europeans settle in Australia?
- -How and why do people choose to remember significant events of the past?

SWIMMING WEEK 1-5

Our 3/4s will be part of the swimming program provided by Kyneton Toyota Sports & Aquatic Centre. The program will consist of 5 one-hour sessions, over the first 5 weeks of Term 2. Each student has been placed into a swimming group based on their point of need, developing their water safety, water awareness and swimming skills. These sessions help to foster independence and organisation skills for each of the students involved.

CAMP JUNE 2-4

Swimming week 1

Both 3/4 classes have the opportunity, this term, to attend a three-day camp

in Toolangi on June 2-4. Camps are a great way to develop and support independence, organisation, responsibility and safe risk taking. Outdoor education camps are an important part of the school curriculum, as they are a liberating way for students to interact with the natural world while learning a range of life skills. We are hopeful that attending this camp will help build peer bonding, encourage physical activity, promote screen-free time, support each of our students to try new experiences and have loads of fun.

Years 5/6

Literacy and Numeracy -

This term in reading, we are focusing on generating and finding literal and inferential questions in our texts. This includes comparing texts and making connections between our knowledge and a text.

In grammar, we are exploring a range of language conventions and punctuation, including punctuating dialogue, contractions, parts of speech and possessives.

We are writing both persuasive and imaginative texts, using a range of prompts to inspire us and exploring topics such as takeaway vs. home cooked, home movies vs. cinema. When writing these texts, we are focusing on using figurative language and persuasive devices to make our writing more interesting to read and to become better writers.

In numeracy, we are exploring fractions, looking closer at comparing fractions, which then leads us into decimals.

Topic focus— This term, our theme focuses on the universe above us. This includes the solar system, the sun, space explorers. This is supported by our class text, 'Space Atlas' by Tom Jackson and Ana Djordjevic.

Other activities -

We have an AUSLAN incursion in week 3 and 5 and we have been practicing signing the alphabet and then using this to spell and sign words, as well as learning about the signs for a range of words.

Graham Knell from the Lancefield Men's Shed paid us a visit prior to ANZAC Day to share his experiences in the Vietnam War. For winter sports, we will be participating in netball and football. The Year 5's will be taking NAPLAN tests in week 4.

Physical Education

Prep/1

Students in prep and year 1 will be focusing on developing Fundamental Motor Skill, in particular throwing and catching. The focus will be on chest passing, correct technique to throw and catch (step, point, throw) and aiming for a target.

Year 2

Year 2 students begun learning fundamental motor skills last term. They are continuing to refine throwing and catching skills with a focus on controlling the ball. They are also beginning to learn about and practice controlling the ball with their feet and kicking.

Year 3/4

These students are beginning a unit on minor games, learning about how to successfully follow rules of games and develop certain strategies. There will also be an emphasis on teamwork, co-operation and sharing with classmates.

Year 5/6

Year 5/6 students have winter sports this term so we are focusing on developing netball skills. We will be learning and practicing using the correct pass in a specific situation, defending and developing an understanding of the rules of the game. Training drills for students in the football team will take place during term 2.

All Students

Years 3-6 will be learning skills required to access athletic activities such as long jump, triple jump, discuss and shot put. All students in the second half of term two will be participating in the sporting schools program from which we received a grant for gymnastics. The Launchpad resource will be used to develop lessons suitable for each year level. We received \$2200 for this program. Part of the money will be used to update equipment for future gymnastics programs. Due to my background in gymnastics I am looking forward to teaching this unit!!

MUSIC

d Students in Foundation will be learning musical language to describe changes in music (loud, soft, dhigh, low, fast, slow – forte / piano, soprano / bass, presto / largo). They will work on 'feeling' the d beat and keeping in time with others when singing and playing instruments. Most students will lacktriangle still be finding their singing voice as we explore what our voices can do using games, songs and rhymes.

lacktriangle Students in grade 1 will be consolidating their knowledge of musical language to describe changes $oldsymbol{l}$ in music as they explore their voices and participate in games and instrument playing. Rhymes, songs and instruments will be used to teach beat, rhythm and melody concepts that will allow students to start reading and writing familiar and created songs.

Students in grade 2 will be consolidating their knowledge of musical language to describe changes lacktriangledown in music as they explore their voices and participate in games and instrument playing. Rhymes, songs and instruments will be used to teach beat, rhythm and melody concepts that will allow lacksquare students to start reading and writing familiar and created songs.

Students in grades 3 and 4 will be exploring melody and rhythm of familiar and new songs. As they become familiar with the patterns, they will create accompaniments using drones and ostinatos (simple musical patterns) and play and write these using computer web sites. They will also be developing their beat as they learn clapping patterns to accompany songs as well as just play these with partners.

Students in grade 5 have been working towards independent / group activities. Term 1 developed skills and knowledge about these areas of music with a specific focus on Beethoven's Fifth Symphony – COMPOSING, LISTENING, PERFORMING, NOTE KNOWLEDGE. This term, students will be developing independent working behaviours as they set goals, apply their skills and work towards: Listening - creating a video / photo story reflecting the mood of a section of Beethoven's Fifth. Composing – creating a piece of music using Beethoven's 'motif' and putting it into a computer program.

Performing – learning how to play the opening melody of Beethoven's Fifth.

Note Knowledge - improving their note knowledge by using an online game and support structures.

Students in grade 6 have been working towards independent / group activities. Term 1 developed skills and knowledge about these areas of music with a specific focus on Beethoven's Fifth Sym-

This term, we are introducing a new social-emotional learning and character education program- the Kimonchis®. Kimochi means "feelings". The curriculum is based on research that when instruction in building social, emotional and behavioural skills are taught, there is a positive effect on how children problem solve and interact. Through fun and practical lessons we will teach: recognising and managing emotions, demonstrating care and concern for others, establishing positive relationships, make responsible decisions and handle challenging situations constructively. This program aligns with our You Can Do It, Berry Street and Respectful Relationships that we currently use and will help strengthen our wellbeing curriculum.

As we work on a unit you will receive communication (through Compass) that outlines what we have been learning about in classes and how you can reinforce and extend the learning at home and will support you as parents and carers. We hope that Kimochis® will be a great new addition to your family and will bring fun and fantastic feelings into your home, as well as support the home to school connection.



Auslan

Australian Sign Language) is the language of the Deaf community of Australia. Austan relies on a combination of hand shapes, movements and facial expressions to deliver messages. Austan has its own grammatical system that is totally separate from English. Like all sign languages, Austan is a visual gestural language, which means it uses movement to convey grammar and meaning at the same time. In contrast, English relies on word order and sentence structure. (Austan in the West)

Over the last term, the staff completed their Auslan Level 1 training from Auslan in the West. During this term, the students will have the opportunity to participate in 2 x 50 minute incursions with Breanna from Auslan in the West. The staff will also undertake a refresher course at the end of term.

The students are starting to learn the Auslan Alphabet. Have a go at practising the alphabet at home.

Play Based Learning with our Koorie Engagement Support Officers

On Tuesday 20th April Renee and Jess our Koorie Engagement Support Officers (KESOs) visited LPS to run an Aboriginal perspectives rotation as part of our Play Based Learning (PBL) program. Renee and Jess came with some Aboriginal artefacts, dolls, books, colouring pages, ochre and other open-ended items that children could visit to engage and interact with.

The children were encouraged to use the resources in a way that was meaningful to them and to ask questions if they wanted to. The students thoroughly enjoyed dressing in the emu feathers, painting their faces



with ochre, using all of the resources to immerse themselves in role-play that included hunting, cooking and caring for the babies. The children used some of the other open-ended resources to create their own games using traditional Aboriginal symbols and memory cards. The idea behind creating this child-led experience is that children connect to the resources and experience them in a genuine and age-appropriate way and begin to form a tangible understanding of how and why some of these items were used by Aboriginal people in the past and why they remain so important to Aboriginal people now.

This hands-on experience aims to create positive memories for the children and also provides some context and relatability when the children engage in further learning about Australia and the First Nations People in the future.
